A 25th anniversary observance



Dear Friends,

What appears above is a partial poster with details about the performance only. The fine print indicates the gravity of the occasion. Lesléa Newman is a poet and was, for a time, the Poet Laureate of Northampton; Jill Kaufman, a reporter for NEPM; Bill Newman a civil rights attorney; Metta Dael an adminstrator at the Northfield Mount Hermon School; and Stan Rosenberg - well, everybody knows Stan, for some years our state senator. He currrently serves with me on the board of the Greenfield Senior Symposia.

So, what about Matthew Shepard? He was a 21-year-old college kid from Laramie, Wyoming - a town a little bigger than Northampton, and the site of the state university. Matthew Shepard was murdered in 1998 in what is now called a "hate crime." The murder was brutal and barbaric. You can read about it in this <u>report</u> by BBC reporter Jude Sheerin.

This murder is reminiscent of the antics of the Ku Kux Klan. However, the murderers of Matthew Shepard were not an organised gang with an agenda, but a couple of youg men with nothing better to do than harass and kill a vulnerable person.

"Considering Matthew Shepard" is an oratorio - a musical setting of an event, told by its characters. Here is the poster in its entirety:



The composer, Craig Hella Johnson, is a well-known choral conductor and composer. A graduate of St. Olaf's College, Juilliard, and Yale, he resides in Texas and has served as Artist in Residence at Texas State University.

The Amherst-based Da Camera Singers, founded in 1973, is directed by Sheila Heffernon, for many years Director of Music at Northfield Mount Hermon School.

The murder of Matthew Shepard is not a pleasant subject. It is not something on which one would wish to dwell. Tragedy often inspires art. So it has in this case. In "Considering Matthew Shepard," we are compelled to confront the story and appreciate the art.

This performance of "Considering Matthew Shepard" will take place this Sunday at Greenfield High School, at 4:00 p.m. It is about an hour and a half long. The

concert is free, but donations will be accepted for the benefit of the <u>Matthew</u> <u>Shepard Foundation</u>.
